### Surf Fishing & BBQ - May 1, 2010


Change of Location - South Mission Beach

We chose South Mission Beach near the jetty because the parking lot should be open from 4 AM until 10 PM and it always has the holes or depressions that will attract and hold perch, croaker and other surf fish. MB Park has good rest rooms and a nice grassy area north of the parking lot where we can set up the BBQ's, There is no shade, so do not forget your sun tan lotion. Bring your folding chairs or beach blanket to sit on. Fish or bring a book and work on your tans. It is pretty easy to find if you ever have been to the roller coaster area. Drive to the south end of Mission Blvd where it stops at the SD River and turn right into the parking area.

Traveling 8 West: (Coming from Mission Valley / La Mesa)

- 1) Take Interstate 8 West and **pass** the Interstate 5 exit by staying in the two left lanes.
- 2) Merge right and exit West Mission Bay Dr. / Sports Arena Blvd. (first exit after I-5)
- 3) Turn right at the stop light, and stay in the right lane.
- 4) Turn right onto West Mission Bay Dr. (2nd right)
- 5) Turn left onto Mission Blvd. Go past roller coaster to end of Mission Blvd.
- 6) Turn right at last stop sign to go to parking lot 1. (Jetty Rd.)

Traveling 5 South: (Coming from North County)

- 1) Take Interstate 5 South to exit #21 Sea World Dr. toward Tecolote Rd.
- 2) Turn right onto Sea World Drive.
- 3) Merge onto W. Mission Bay Drive.
- 4) Turn left onto Mission Blvd. Go past roller coaster to end of Mission

Blvd


5) Turn right at last stop sign to go to parking lot 1. (Jetty Rd.)

The true blue surf anglers should try to be fishing at least a half hour before sunrise (6:04). Steve Piper can't make the outing this time since he will be at the One Fly Surf Contest up the coast; but he would be happy that we are going to try to start at 5 or 5:30. Steve reminds us that the perch start to move out of the very shallow waters when the sun starts hitting the water. (Also if the city forgets to unlock the gate really early, we might need to walk in or drive over some grassy areas.) Surf fishing can be an early morning game unless it is very cloudy or foggy or the water is very foamy. (That's why I always liked sunset until 10 PM instead of the 5 until 9 game.LK) SDFF members that are not crazy can arrive any time before 8 or 9 and we will have someone to help you get your feet wet. We will need to watch our backcasts to keep from hitting joggers or bathers.

There will be a minus 0.7 ft tide at 6:16 on the last day of four day spring grunion run. Look for the holes and depressions to fish on the incomming tide later in the morning. Hopefully there will be some predators like halibut or even bass near the jetty that have moved into shallow water for the grunion feast. Very small grunion fry will have hatched from earlier runs. Beds of sand crabs are developing on area beaches and Louie Zimm suspects there should be small 1½ inch perch fry in the surf. If the bait is swirling around in those sand depressions some kind of predator should be there.

Louie writes: That is a good halibut time and there should also be some perch fry in the water. Small 1½ to 2 inch silver and white clousers with either a little bit of orange or green magic marker on the tail. When I was catching calicos and halibut in the surf a few years back, I did use 4-5 inch long flies to imitate grunion. Just make sure vou have some weedless flies in case the dreaded loose kelp mats move in. Also recommend a stripping basket, especially if you want to fish off the jetty. Also don't forget the tape for the fingers. We would use 6, 7 or 8 weight rods. If it is really calm then the floating line/ long leader approach could work, other wise 200 grain sinking head would be the ticket.

Steve Piper writes: I have caught my better hallies on orange flies - e.g. Piconi Prowler and Clouser darter (olive/orange) - and on brown clousers. There may be good corbina action by May 1. We can't count out hallies in early May. (They could already be in the bays.) I caught a good number of small to medium perch on a variety of flies (at Black's on 2nd week in April) I would fish the Surf Rat, Bonefish Critter, and a small baitfish pattern. A great crossover pattern that works lots is the olive/orange Clouser darter - a cool pattern that I keep re-discovering - it works as a baitfish and as a crab or shrimp. might add: Cronin's Surfin Merkin (orange thread, gray EP fibers with sililegs) in size 6 and 8 as a good sand crab pattern to try. LK would add some Kim's Surf Worms, Doug's DUI, Doug's Imp, baby EP Perch and some grey deer hair sand crabs. I might try some extremely small and sparse pinhead min-

nows to simiulate grunion fry. The perch must be eating them after a big hatch on the high tides. A little white and silver scud hanging on a dropper above your heavy clouser might be fun to try. A minnow chasing a small bait is a trick to trigger the competitive instincts. There used to be a good halibut holding area off the seaward side of the jetty, about 1/3 of the way to the end. Cast out 50

feet and slow retrieve on the bottom to the edge of the rocks. The big rip tide along the jetty moves bait from the shore to this area.

Hopefully Jon Hee and some of our experienced members will be available to give some lessons. Bob Pharoah and Barry Pechersky will be working the Mentor Program if you need to borrow

a few flies or some equipment. It might be a little cold for early morning wet wading. Don't forget your safety belt for your waders. It is never fun to fall in and let your waders fill up with water, plus it can be dangerous.

# Fly Fishing Notes for the Irristibles and Ideas for fishing On Foot for the Green River By Lucky Ketcham, Aprill 14, 2010

am preparing for my Green River SDFF Presentation, May 3, 2010 and thought about letting people know they can easily fish from shore if they are uncomfortable with the thought of boats and rapid water. You can also bring a spinning rod as a back up if you are new to fly fishing. Fishing rapala lures below the dam for giant 24 inch brown trout is not uncommon in the evening.

I was feeling guilty that I have not helped the 62 "Irresistible" women in our club get organized for fishing adventures in 2010. Last year in March we had a day at Miramar Lake. March is already gone and I am sitting on my butt being lazy. I thought I should do something that might encourage some of our newest members to fish and enjoy the sport with or without men. I thought about some of the ladies I have fished with and perhaps some of their stories might be interesting.

My Grandmother, Charlotte May Ketcham (Wiggins) was the first person to take me fishing. She loved the water and the little lakes in the Catskill Mountains. My mother did not drive a car until I was 15 and my father was always working on the farm, so it was my grandmother that would take me to the mountain cabins on lakes with names like Neversink, Wannasink, Minnisink and of course Yankee Lake. She always had stories of her cousins that caught more fish in the rivers because they would turn over rocks and beat the bushes to find out what the fish were feeding on. She would save rooster neck feathers from the Rhode Island Reds and Plymouth Rock chickens and give them to her cousins. (Grandma and I often plucked all the chickens for dinner on the farm.) When I was older she encouraged me to tie my own flies. She would buy special roosters and guinea hens at the farmer's auctions so that I would have a variety of hackles. She bought me muskrat and fox traps for hair and fur dubbing.

Eileen Stroud. I never fished with Eileen, but listened to her stories for 30 years and loved to hear Bill describe how she would often catch more fish than the men and how many species of fish she caught in the mountains and oceans. You can not write about lady anglers that encourage other ladies to fish without mentioning Eileen Stroud. She had a sparkle in her eye that I love to see in people. When I started fly tying I only liked to tie "little brown ugly nymph's that caught fish" and Catskill style dry flies. Those flies worked for my first 20 years and I did not see the need to change. Eileen and Bill encouraged me to add reds and oranges into my fly patterns and take the SDFF classes from Tom Smith and Gary Hilbers. I remember Eileen saying that I wasn't too adventurous in my fly selections and would show me some of her little flies and colorful creations to encourage me. She created a monster. It is too bad we lost Eileen. She was a good role model for our young ladies.

Kim Jones's husband does not like to fish but that does not stop her from getting in her float tube on the SD Bay. Kim will often rent a Seaforth skiff with a friend and drift for bass and bonefish off the Seal Training center. She is a great source of fly fishing information for new people. I know when I see an angler with a pink hat and pony tail at Tidelands Park I will get a fishing lesson that day.

Gretchen Yearous is always fun to fish with. I was vaccinated with a phonograph needle and I can almost keep up with her stories and gift of gab. Gretchen has been a great contact and will always promote fly fishing among the ladies.

I have never fished with Shelley Wagner but her stories of fishing in far off lands "down under" are always interesting and you can't help but know she can catch fish. Trying to get the Irresistibles up and going again is sometimes frustrating for the fomer leaders.

Gordie Zimm, Mona Morabello, Rose Yamasaki, Diane Stafford, Jayne Ditmars, Maria Goldman, Helen Grundler ... are Irristibles that are rumored to catch more and larger fish than most men. Our new members should get to know them.

There are women fly fishing groups that get out and go places with or without their husbands. The last two years there has been a group of 12 to 15 ladies from Montana, Arizona and Florida that meet at the Green River about mid-June for a week to 10 days. Some stay in the resorts, some have RV's, and some camp. They often fish on foot in the mornings and evenings at the Little Hole Recreation Area. Some might hire a guide and drift the river one or two days, but primarily they help each other and fish the shallow riffles or small eddies along the banks. The Irresistibles could easily mimic their style.

The last three years there has been a little lady that looks and acts like Gretchen's mother or older aunt. She is a spark plug that livens up the river drifts. She is retired, lives in Forida, travels in her RV, fishes 200 days a year, usually with a guide and lives for the adventure of fly fishing. She also joined the Montana ladies club last year for the companionship. She loves the dry fly and throws big Fat Albert foam flies for giant brown trout. I hope she is there in 2010.

Ole and Katrina is a couple from Connectictut, orginally from Norway. They come to the Green every year in June and fish from shore. They never hire a guide; never float the river in boats, rafts or pontoons. They would sit patiently at the boat launch in the mornings waiting for each batch of boaters to leave and then make graceful casts to the fish in the large pool and first runs below the dam. Katrina had a wonderful casting stroke when she had room for a back cast on the launch ramp. They hiked independently down the river a few miles every day making even better one hand spey casts to fish along the bank and in little eddys. Brown trout are very shore oriented and it is often better not to get into the water to fish for them. Accurate hook casts to the seam 6 inches off the bank can be the game. When it was cold they fished BWO emergers at Little Hole, Coney Island in the foam of the pools.

# Green River Camping Trip June 2010

Locky and I will be traveling to the Green River, leaving San Diego on June 8, 2010. We will be traveling from San Diego to Dutch John, Utah. We will be camping at the Mustang Ridge Campground. The Campground is located three miles north of Dutch John on US 191. in the Flaming Gorge National Recreation Area (FGNRA), in the Ashley National Forest. Turn west on Forest Road 184 for approximately 2 miles and follow the signs. Golden Age Passes are accepted making camp sites half price. The Campground is semi-primitive with flush toilets and showers. None of the campsites have electricity. We will be staying the maximum time allowed (16 days) at a minimum and may stay longer depending on the fishing.

If you do not wish to "rough it" reasonable accommodations are available in Dutch John.

The fly shop located at the corner of Highway 191 and Little Hole Road has a bulletin board for posting messages. We will post messages as too our site location on 3 X 5 cards with a "SDFF MESSAGE" heading.

We extend everyone the invitation to join us at any time. We float the "A" section, from the Flaming Gorge dam to Little Hole with our pontoon boats, a distance of seven miles. We will be glad to show you the ropes and help you down the river. A Coast Guard approved PFD is required and inflatables are NOT allowed. Wade fishing is also available if you do not want to float the river.

Be sure to bring your 2-way radios so we can maintain communications on the river.

Verison cell phone service is good in the campground area. There is a chance of high water and cold temperatures the first week, new floaters might wait until mid June to join us to have lower flows and better chance for the cicada hatch.

### **Trip Ideas from the SDFF Travel Committee**

Here are a couple of proposed trip ideas from the Travel committee.

- 1) A camping weekend trip to Cuyamaca with time for fishing and artistic pursuits. Fly fishers also equipped with cameras, sketch pads and/or canvas can share their artistic interests and interpretations when not fishing. Maybe non-fishing spouses, friends or family would enjoy this as well. Individually or in groups, perhaps an artistic focus on the lake and surroundings would best combine our interests.

# FLY OF THE MONTH

### Rainey Foam Post Midge Emerger

Photo and recipe by Norb Spitzer, guess at instructions by Lucky.

Norb reports this fly has been incredibly productive for him on rivers like the Taylor, South Platte and Gunnison in Colorado, Hot Creek and Upper Owens' River in CA. It produced two 4 pound trout from a single eddy on the Taylor. I can see it as a good PMD emerger in size 16—but that is not a midge.



Hook: TMC 100 or 101 dry fly hook sizes 18 to 24

Thread: Yellow 8/0

Tail: None (optional shuck of a few strands of amber Antron) this is an emerger.

Post: Rainey's White or Yellow small cylinder closed foam posts

**Rib:** Brown 8/0 thread

Body: Cream / light yellow fine dry fly dubbing

Hackle: Grizzly - sparse collar style.

emember use a minimal number of thread wraps and sparse materials on dry flies. Pinch the barb and mount the hook on a size 18 or smaller midge dry fly hook. I use straight eye TMC 101's for flies smaller than 22 to increase the gap opening and the hook set. Off-setting the hook point a little also helps.

Make a jam knot at the 7/8 hook shank and wrap a tight thread base to about the hook point and back to mid shank. The Rainey foam posts are about an inch long and you should be able to get three flies from a single post. Cut the tip of the post to a sharp angle to aid in catching the foam. Hold the foam on top of the hook and make a few pinch wraps to catch the tip. Keep the post on top while wrapping thread to the 7/8 mark, maybe two hook eye diameters back from the eye. Make two thread wraps in front of the post to lock it in and prop it up. Now make thread wraps to the mid shank and attach a 3 inch length of fine 8/ O brown thread for the rib. Pull back on the rib while wrapping the yellow thread to the rear. Note that Norb has the rib tied down on the bottom of the hook. It is a little detail, but when he makes the spiral rib wrap he will show a full wrap of thread from above. Flies do just

do not look right in the box if they have a half wrap of rib at the back of the fly. That Norb is good, but I would also have one wrap of dubbing behind the rib. Pull the rib to the rear. Wax the thread and place just a wisp of very fine Cream or Cahill yellow dry fly dubbing on the thread. You just want "Bumpy Thread" for the dubbing." Catch the end of the noodle with one wrap of thread and you can tighten the noodle even smaller. Pull the rib down and make one very small wrap of dubbing behind the rib, then pull the rib to the rear while making a slightly tapered body up to the rear of the foam post. Do not dub the front of hook yet.

Prepare a stiff grizzly saddle hackle sized for the hook at  $1\frac{1}{2}$  hook gap barb length. Clip the barbs from 1/8 of the quill end for a clean tie down place. Lay the quill against the hook shank and make three securing wraps of thread. You always want to tie the hackle quill against bare hook or hard thread. That is why you do not dub the front of the post first. When the hackles pull off the soft dubbing a few times you will remember. Use Gary Hiber's trick of figure 8 wrapping around the quill and hook shank and fold the tip to lock it in place. Trim excess hackle quill close to hook.

Make a little umbrella shaped hackle collar right behind the foam post with 3 to 5 wraps of hackle right against each other. Secure with two wraps of thread and then make one wrap of hackle around the base of the post for some extra legs. Tie down the hackle behind the hook eye with three tight wraps and two half hitches. Trim the hackle stem close to the hook. Now add another small amount of dubbing in front of the post to complete the thorax and hide any thread. Whip finish. Now hold onto the white foam post and clip it relatively short to give a little white headlight to help you see the fly. Save the long section of post for the next fly.

Do not put any floatant on the rear of the fly. You want the bend of the hook and abdomen to be visible below the surface. The hackle and

foam sticks up. The head light helps you see the fly and detect micro drag.

#### Variations:

Tie this is olive green and yellow rib for Blue Wing Olives.

Black with light rib for midges Grey with yellow rib for midges

Use yellow or pink posts when fishing in white foam lines

Add 3 or 4 strands of amber Antron as a trailing shuck

Add tip of small grizzly neck hackle as raccoon style shuck.

Wrap the grizzly hackle parachute style around the white post and you have another good midge pattern, the Head Light Emerger.

Lucky's Fly Fishing Tip: You can't go wrong with any pattern Norb Spitzer recommends.


