

The Largemouth Bass of Diamond Valley Lake

In mid October, Gretchen Yearous and I fished for largemouth bass at Diamond Valley Lake, a reservoir operated by The Metropolitan Water District of



We arrived at the Lake gate at 6:45AM, and there was already a long line of cars and boats waiting for the gate to open. But, after a short wait, the gate opened and we were able to meet up with our guide, Alex Cady, at the launch ramp at 7:30AM.

After brief introductions, we put our gear in Alex's boat, and within minutes we were on our way! Our first stop was at a cove on the south side of Lake. Here, Alex put an EP Silversides Minnow on Gretchen's fly rod. Wanting to see if that was the fly that the bass wanted, he cast out ... and promptly caught a nice bass on his first cast!

Later in the morning, he took us to



a cove with a lot of stickups. Here, we could see the shad being driven to the surface, and occasionally, a bass would jump completely out of the water!

Gretchen and I made a number of casts in this spot, but had difficulty in getting the right action to get the bass to take our flies.

We fished a number of coves like this, but I have to admit, the fishing was a little slow that day. Although we knew the fish were there, they were difficult to catch! Alex, however, worked very hard the entire time, trying to put us on the fish. He would look for signs, like the location of the grebes and herons, areas of nervous water, and use his

Golden Trout Wilderness; Boulder Creek

Five fearless SDFF volunteers challenged October snow storms to drop our cattle exclusion fence in Casa Vieja Meadow at the south end of the Golden Trout Wilderness. By delaying one day we missed most of the snow and had great weather even at 9,000 feet. We had the fence down by noon and spent the afternoon "inspecting" the wild trout population. We found several beautiful 8" and 9" Golden trout that would happily hang from various #14 to #18 dry flies while we admired them. The fence is in good shape so the trip next June, to put the fence up, should be a great one. If you are interested contact me via the email address below.

Locally, our efforts to help the San Diego River Park Foundation purchase and protect up to 14 acres of imperiled watershed on upper **Boulder Creek** has been a great success! The first 2½ acres has closed escrow and we are working with the fisheries biologist at the San Diego DFG office to do a survey of the wild trout on the property. Between San Diego Fly Fishers, Golden State Flycasters, San Diego Trout and memorial funds for Bill and Eileen Stroud and Skip Price, we

raised more than \$20,000 for this purchase. That is an unbelievably generous amount when we think that between the clubs there are less than 500 people. That amounts to \$40 per fly fisher and would not have been possible without your continued support for our Annual Raffle and Silent Auction. The San Diego River Park Foundation continues to raise matching funds and apply for various grant funds to pay off the remaining loan and to finalize the purchase of an additional 11 1/2 acres upstream of the first parcel. With existing USFS land, these purchases will ensure the protection of this important wild trout habitat that lies just a few miles below Lake Cuyamaca.

The long range plan is to not only protect the wild trout that are there and possibly restock with native steelhead, but also to use this area as a research station for various watershed and wildlife monitoring projects. San Diego State University, DFG (soon to be DFW), California Regional Water Quality Control Board, San Diego River Park Foundation and the San Diego River Conservancy are all



looking at funding for various scientific projects such as fish counts, fish tissue sampling, water flow and quality measurements, wildlife cameras, population surveys and habitat restoration.

If anything can help us restore some of the native and wild trout populations in our local, upper watersheds, this type of intense research can lead the way. We are going to make sure that the progress and results of the studies are made available to the public and especially to the generous fly fishing community that made it all possible. Thank You!

electronics in deciding where to stop and fish.

Gretchen caught the largest fish of the day, a hard fighting 2 pounder. It put a nice bend in her rod, and did not come to the boat easily! I caught several bass, too, hooking one by my estimate, between 1 and 6 pounds. © Unfortunately, it threw my hook after becoming airborne, so I was unable to weigh it for you.



We fished with 7 weight fly rods, each strung with fast sinking shooting heads. Using Alex's custom tied EP Minnows with weed guards, we would cast close to the shoreline in the stickups. After waiting about 10 to 20 seconds, depending on the location, we would then begin a moderately fast strip retrieve through the underwater structure. When a bass took our fly, we would do a strip set, and then as Alex instructed us, raise our rod

tips to play the fish.

With this style of fishing, you will lose a good number of flies... which is another good reason to use a guide!

Diamond Valley Lake is a huge lake, with a steep and rocky shoreline. Although we did see a number of shoreline trout fishermen near the Marina, to successfully fly fish for bass, you will need a boat.

Alex is very knowledgeable and a passionate fly fishing guide. In his comfortable and clean boat ... and by the way, fast boat, we were able to get to the various fishing spots quickly, and maximize our time on the water. It was a terrific experience using shooting heads and his shad patterns, and casting wherever we saw shad boiling on the surface!

Because Diamond Valley Lake is so close to San Diego, this lake should be on your "places to fish" list.

We had a great time with Alex, and I want to thank him offering this half day guided trip at our Annual Raffle's silent auction. He can be reached at

The fish were taken with a two fly combo of standard White and Chartreuse Green Clouser Minnows and Orange and Brown. I am sure the Rootbeer and Orange Kim's Z Worm will be good choice tied above the standard Clouser patterns.

Helpful Fishing Tips (from FFF newsletter *International FLYFISHER*)

- As the waters cool into fall, those of us that fish with streamers have a tendency to use a slow strip. Sometimes a very fast strip will elicit a strike. The quick movement does not give the fish a chance to see what it is; just that it appears to be food. Any species, salt or fresh, warm water or cold, has the ability to make some surprisingly fast charges when eating is at stake.

"How To"...SDFF Meeting Set-up and Breakdown 2013

SET UP

- > Arrive by 6:30 PM
- ➤ Unlock SDFF cabinets (located on stage left) combination lock # 1-2-3
- > Carry name-tag cases to back of auditorium. Cases are located adjacent to cabinets
- > Someone is usually there by 6:00 PM to set up condiment table and start coffee
- Move salad bar tables flat against the wall (if they are set up)
- Set up tables next to back windows for name tag boxes
- > Arrange table for raffle ticket sales
- Arrange 1 table for door prizes
- > Set up club P.A. system (found in cabinets on stage)
- > Set up table for projectors, extension cord in cabinet and pull down screen in back of stage
- > Make sure faculty restrooms are unlocked and hall lights are on (see custodian)
- > Check with custodian about heater for auditorium if needed
- > Put out large trash cans and recycle bin (from teacher's lounge)
- Set up 10 rows of 10 chairs (5 chairs on each side of aisle)

BREAKDOWN

- > Be sure all chairs and tables are returned to original positions
- > Check and clean up trash, spills, and crumbs
- > Turn off and put away microphone, screen and projector
- > Return coffee pot, condiment box, blue bin, and name tag boxes to cabinet. LOCK CABINET!




