In 1951, she captured the Fisherman's Distance event while vying against an all-male line-up. Joan cast a fly 161-feet in one competition. Joan is the co-founder and chief instructor of the Wulff School of Fly Fishing in Lew Beach, New York. She has appeared in many fishing films and authored Joan Wulff's Fly Casting Techniques; Fly Fishing: Expert Advice from a Woman's Perspective and Fly Casting Accuracy. Her DVD, Joan Wulff's Dynamics of Fly Casting, is one of the most respected and the

highest selling casting DVD ever produced.

Through promotion of catch and release, she has helped sport fishing be ac cepted as environmentally-sustainable. Both Joan and her late, legendary hus

band, Lee Wulff, have had a positive impact on fly-fishing.

SWC FFF: The Southwest Council Federation of Fly Fishers is composed of 23 individual

Members Fishing Reports

Lucky Ketcham fishes the salt-I finally went fishing off Chula Vista at J Street with Bob Pharoah and Mark Sweat early Saturday morning (April 30th). 7 until 11.

I caught 6 small spotted bay bass from 5 to 10 inches long. Bob caught a few more. One little 3 inch bass tried to eat his Kim's Z Worm.

Bob must have hooked and lost another 10 fish. He was starting to believe me that I cut all the barbs and points of his saltwater flies when I had them for two weeks. I did not want him to hurt him self on all those sharp points.

Mark Sweat was fishing separately with a fishing buddy from Bakersfield. They were on the water by 6 and caught up to 20 larger spotted bay bass. Mark followed the local kayakers up to the mouth of the Sweetwater River and the deeper channel where it zig zags off National City.

It was a longer kick in a float tube but Mark is young and strong. The water was like glass early in the morning and the sunrise was good to see after months of sitting at home. The power boaters were very careful when passing near me in the little Fish Cat float tube. They created very little wake. I think I was still in the 5 mph zone. SD Bay - no launch fees, easy access and good fishing — try it you'll like it. At 5:30 in the morning it is only 15 minutes from my door. (if I drive 70 or 80 mph with no traffic)

My SD Bay expert, Marvin Darling, told me that the water on the Chula Vista flats at J Street is getting too warm for a good comfortable oxygen content. Most of the larger bass, bonefish and bait have moved to the deeper colder water off National City and Sweetwater. It might be easier for me to launch at Pepper Park, off 14th Street in National City. If I fish the J Street channel near markers 17 and 18 you will get mostly small bass. (That is what Bob and I found. We were trying for the small bass slam - catching 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10 inch bass. I caught most of mine drifting over the outer and inner edges of the channel. I had to move closer to shore and drift over the outer edge of the eel grass as the sun got higher in the sky. Bob was out on the flat and may actually caught a bonefish about 15 inches. It did not fight very hard. I did not see it and Bob does not know what they look like - silver with an odd nose, no fang tooth like a Corvina, no barbel and down turned mouth or yellow fins - not a croaker.

Tip: When Marvin Darling speaks - you should listen and take notes. I'm going to add that note to my late April Fishing Calendar.

Gretchen, Sonia, Heidi and Kim Jones fished Sutherland on Saturday. Kim and Sonia caught some trout and the Irressitibles had a nice morning on the lake. How come I did not see Theresa Spencer's name on this list of beauties? Where was Suzie? Look at the video of Mish on her paddle board. That "little tug" double haul

and shooting all that line is what you are practicing every Sunday. You can do it too.

6 May Lucky and I (Bob Pharoah) fished San Diego Bay at Sweetwater river outlet for the first time. We launched at Pepper Park in National City and found it farther to the fishing flats than we had thought. It is a very long kick out in a float tube. For your information, the park is locked until 6 AM. We arrived around 5:30 and had to wait. Lucky had a rough day fighting a leaking tube and had to fish in shallow water. He gave up and went home a little early. I used my electric motor so I was able to fish out on the flats and found a honev hole. I fished from 6:30 until 9:30, caught 10 Sand Bass and 1 Yellow Fin Croaker. The water was 67 degrees, the wind was on the chilly

LUCKY

We fished from Pepper Park at the foot of Tidelands Avenue, in National City.

I have taken small boats, my kayak and a pontoon boat out of there over the years but forgot how long a kick it would be in my old Fish Cat float tube. When you are in a power boat like Al Venton's we get out to the channel in a few minutes. It seemed I had to kick almost a mile to get out to channel marker 3. I usually like to throw heavy flies to the pilings and shade of the long loading dock. This morning a giant new car freighter arrived just as we were heading out and it looked too dangerous to go over to the dock. Without a fish finder or depth finder I had a hard time finding the

edges of the channels. I kicked way down to channel marker #3, part way to Chula Vista, to be certain I was on a break. Bob does not tell you that it was one of the worst tide days that you could imagine. I fished the dead low - minus tide until it was just starting to come in. When the wind started to kick up I was bouncing around in my little float tube, stopping only to go into the mud flats and pump up one side of the float tube. The last time I tightened the cap on the valve so tight that I could not get it open without taking the entire valve apart. I was a mile and a quarter from the launch with one tube completely empty. With a little effort I was able to get the top valve open again and inflated the tube. For a few minutes I was afraid I was going to have to swim kick back to the dock with only one side of the float tube as a float. About that time the bacon and eggs sandwich and two cups of coffee started to come up on me. I don't usually get sea sick, but the bouncing around and aggravation without a bite from the bass was too much for me. I yelled at Bob that I was finished having fun for the morning and headed in.

I'm going to have to order a new valve or bladder for my old Fish Cat. It has served me well. Like me it is getting old. I would not recommend taking a float tube out of Pepper Park, unless you wanted to stay in the river channel and fish the dock pilings and the rock wall near the launch. Fish will move back there in the colder winter months, but when the water temperature gets close to 70 there is not enough oxygen

for the fish to be comfortable. Bob found cooler deeper water out in the real bay.

When I was down at channel marker #3 the tide started to come in. That is usually good for moving the bait, but the tide in the channel was like a river and wanted to take me to Chula Vista to the south. I had to kick fairly hard to get back north to the Sweetwater River, all while urping and having stomach cramps. I was wondering: "When does this start to be fun?" Some days even a seasoned fishing fool or addict has to remind himself that he likes fly fishing. I fished 6:30 until 9 AM without a bite.

Launching and fishing from J Street, Bayside Park and Tidelands are all much easier. The little kayak launch beach at Bayside Park gets to the dredged channel and eel grass beds within several hundred feet from shore. It is much easier to find the fish holding area. A moderately long kick north gets you to where the channel zig zags. The local kayakers have been catching some of the larger spotted bay bass there all week. Chartreuse and Olive/brown Clousers were the color. Mark Sweat had luck with a Kim Z's worm - rootbeer cactus chenille with a brown marabou tail. Bob and I have been using the bright orange tailed version. See the fly hanging in the mouth of a nice yellow fin croaker. The unweighted worm has been a good pattern when fished above a heavy fly and bounced along the bottom.

JOE'S DREAM CAME TRUE





FLY OF THE MONTH

Krabby Patty a surf fly by Kevin Green

Hook: Gamakatsu B105 Stinger hook, size 6

Thread: Brown 3/0

Large Bead-Chain - painted black Eyes:

Tail: Red marabou

Underbody: Spirit River's "Speckled Chenille" in brown Hackle: Spirit River's "Palmer Chenille Rootbeer"

Head Cement: Sally's Hard as Nails

evin Green is an avid surf fly fisher who haunts the waters of Newport and Laguna Beach. He posts his reports on Fliflicker.com under username Kevin. Thanks to Kevin for giving me permission to share pattern with San Diego surf

anglers.

He uses several variations of the above fly. The intent was to mimic the colors, general size and shape of the little "jetty crabs" in Newport. I thought the perch would go for something like that. When I finished the first tie, I thought it looked like a crab hiding in the kelp patty not really what I intended.

Nevertheless, it catches fish like a champ - perch, halibut, croaker and corbina so far. The key ingredient is the "Palmer Chenille Rootbeer," which has great movement and fishy eye-catching pearly colors.

This is a simple fly pattern, tie it as you would a beadchain eyed woolly worm, substituting the new "palmer chenille" for the hackle. Stoke the long filaments to the rear of the fly as you palmer wrap to prevent tangles tied down fibers. I think you could substute a standard saltwater hook but the Gamakatsu is a very sharp hook right out of the package.

Variations and Use:

I do an orange version of the Krabby Patty too. I like the red in turbulent off-color water, and the orange version for clearer water. The orange version still uses the rootbeer (or brown) palmer chenille, but it uses orange thread, orange marabou tail, and orange "base" chenille (beneath the palmer chenille). For the base chenille, I like something with some flash. The base chenilles I'm using at the moment are "New Age Chenille," in size 2, in "orange crush" and "sparkling

wine." Very sexy! Like the palmer chenille, the New Age Chenille also seems to be supplied by multiple vendors; I have one package from "Cascade Crest Tools" and another from "Riverborn"

You are a detail guy, so I'll give you one last detail. The palmer chenille comes in a wide variety of colors. I've tried olive and orange versions for the Krabby Patty, but they did seem to work as well. That oily iridescent rootbeer color seems to be the magic stuff. Why? I think it's because that color looks a lot like some of the polycheate worms I've seen.

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
