

The intervening years of drought and the wild fires, have killed most if not all the remaining native trout in Sweetwater Creek. There is a good possibility that the seven trout now in captivity are the only remnants of this unique trout species. With encouragement from Allen Greenwood, the trout have been transferred to the Hubbs-Sea World Research Institute. Hubbs Sea World is beginning an intense breeding project with the hope that we may be able to reintroduce these beautiful fish back into their native habitat.

In December I contacted Hubbs-Sea World to see if we could help with the project. They enthusiastically suggested that our donation could be used to pay for a ultra-violet water sanitizer used to ensure the fish tanks do not become contaminated. The SDFF Board authorized a donation of \$500.

Paul Curtis, a Senior Research Biologist at Hubbs-Sea World and the resident expert in fish reproduction,

Paul showed us around the huge tanks containing white sea bass. Hubbs-Sea World has successfully produced more than 1,000,000 white sea bass at their Carlsbad hatchery, which have been released into local bays and coastal habitats to replenish seriously impacted populations. Other tanks contained striped bass, yellowtail, California halibut and rock fish which are being bred to replenish impacted populations and for aqua-culture, to help feed a hungry world

The trout are kept in a separate building where Rob Fletcher takes care of them on a day to day basis. The temperature and lighting are being meticulously adjusted to match current conditions on upper Sweetwater Creek. The new "SDFF" UV sterilizer is hard at work. The biologists hope that the trout can be encouraged

toward a normal Steelhead spring spawning schedule. After nine years in captivity it may be difficult to get the males and females on the same schedule. We helped Paul and Rob net each fish, move them to a large bucket with anesthetic and then carefully inspect, weigh and measure them, one at a time. Rob works with the fish so often he has named them. I helped put some antiseptic on "Old One Eye's" left side. He lost his eye years ago; probably in a fight with the dominant male (I call him "Stud Man", which is wishful thinking). "Stud man" is one handsome dude. He is changing to spawning colors. He has a well developed kipe and bright red lateral line. "Big Mamma" is the most impressive. She topped the scales over 5 pounds and measured nearly 19 inches. The biologists inspected her carefully and happily reported her reproductive organs approaching full bloom. The other two females and two small males are also very healthy. They are all getting lots to eat and are growing rapidly.

It is a long shot to believe that the trout will successfully spawn after so many years in captivity. But, they are

healthy, and in the care of some of the finest fisheries biologists in the world. All we can do is hope, and dream about how great it will be if our cooperative efforts result in replenishing this unique native trout population. Hopefully in a few months we will have dozens of bright Sweetwater trout fingerlings.

In the mean time, Allen would like to train a couple of SDFF volunteers to hike to specific locations on upper Sweetwater Creek and retrieve the data from the logging thermometers. This basic entomology workshop is effective because she speaks simple English, no latin entomology confusion spoken. If you want to catch more fish, this is a necessary tool in your arsenal of skills to fool the fish.

FLY OF THE MONTH

EP SPARKLE CLOUSER (Notes by SDFF, Lucky Ketcham, 1/02/06)

Hook Mustad 3407, size 4, salt water hook

Thread Danville flat waxed nylon, #210Denier. (3/0) Color: white Eyes Dumbbell, lead eyes, yellow and black or red and black,

Small 6/32, 1/36 or medium 7/32, 1/24

Tail/belly White buck tail

Belly Enrico Puglisi, EP Sparkle #03, Crystal Blue - fine dubbing Wing Orange buck tail, or Chartreuse Green and dark green buck tail Accent Copper crystal flash on top of orange wing- 2 long strands folded

Peacock crystal flash on top of green wing





dubbed" with some new Crystal Blue EP Sparkle.

f the Bonefish and Spotted Bay Bass are hit clump of 30 to 50 fine fibers; attach by the middle ting Orange or Chartreuse Clousers in San Di at the bend. Pull back the front fibers and evenly ego Bay this month. Maybe they will like this spread on both sides of shank. Lock in with one or variation. A combination - Clouser and Erico Puglisi two wraps over the fold. Advance the thread 1/8 inch Sparkle Minnow. The belly is sparsely "clump and tie in another clump dubbing. Repeat two more times to make a sparse translucent belly. Comb out with bodkin needle or scissor tips. Tear off or trim Short version of instructions: Tie the first half of to desired shape. Finish the top wing, of the Clouser a normal deep Clouser minnow. Enhance the belly to the standard pattern. New tiers - email with the new EP Sparkle fibers. Tease out a thin lketch@intrepid.warped.com for detailed directions.



"How To"...SDFF Meeting Set-up and Breakdown 2006

SET UP

- ♦ Arrive by 6:30 PM
- ♦ Unlock SDFF cabinets (located on stage left) combination lock #1-2-3
- Carry name-tag cases to back of auditorium. Cases are located adjacent to cabinets.
- Someone is usually there by 6:00 PM to set up condiment table and start coffee
- Move salad bar tables flat against the wall (if they are set up)
- Set up tables next to back windows for name tag boxes
- ♦ Arrange table for raffle ticket sales
- Arrange 2-3 tables in front of stage steps for raffle items
- ♦ Set up club P.A. system on stage left.
- Set up slide projector(extension cord in cabinet) and pull down screen in back of stage
- Make sure faculty restrooms are unlocked and hall lights are on (see custodian)
- Check with custodian about heater for auditorium if needed
- Put out large trash cans and can recycle bin (from teacher's lounge)
- Set up 10 rows of 16 chairs (8 chairs on each side of aisle)

BREAKDOWN

- Be sure all chairs and tables are returned to original positions
- Check and clean up trash, spills, and crumbs
- Turn off and put away microphone, screen, and projector
- Return coffee pot, condiment box, blue bin, and name tag boxes to cabinet. LOCK CABINET!
- Custodian is responsible for shutting down and locking up but please double check any windows that may have been opened

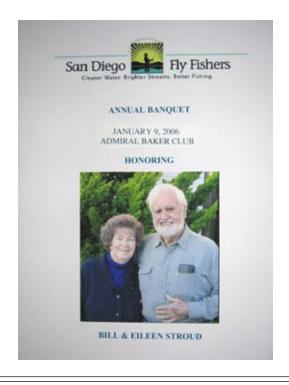
It is important that we return this room to the same order as we found it as the school uses this room first thing in the morning and they have no time to rearrange before the kids arrive.


