The catching numbers were so bad in the first 2 months that if it weren't for bluegill, there wouldn't be any reason to go. We had fishing bloopers going on all day. Fishing happens! Suzie gets the blue ribbon for courage for unexpectedly dealing with her dog at 3:30 a.m. covered in skunk spray and then forgot to put her shoes in the truck and drove home barefoot. I didn't double check my car after everyone transferred my gear to Bob's truck so we got to the gate without my 6 wt. Bob graciously went back to my car at the shopping center to get it and

forgot how to get back to the lake. I just thought he had awaken Wayne and was having coffee with him till the next gate go in. We were checked by DFG and Bob left his license on his old hat in his truck, so we did as requested, and went back to the truck from the end of Pine Arm and got the hat to prove that our gang abides by the law.

Background: Joan Wulff is one of the world's most famous fly fishers. From 1937 as an 11-

year old tournament caster in Patterson, New Jersey to 1960, she won numerous International and National tournament casting titles. In 1951, she captured the Fisherman's Distance event while vying against an all-male line-up. Joan cast a fly 161-feet in one competition. Joan is the co-founder and chief instructor of the Wulff School of Fly Fishing in Lew Beach, New York. She has appeared in many fishing films and authored Joan Wulff's Fly Casting Techniques; Fly Fishing: Expert Advice from a Woman's Perspective and Fly Casting Accuracy. Her DVD, Joan Wulff's Dynamics of Fly Casting, is one of the most respected and the

highest selling casting DVD ever produced.

Through promotion of catch and release, she has helped sport fishing be ac cepted as environmentally-sustainable. Both Joan and her late, legendary hus

band, Lee Wulff, have had a positive impact on fly-fishing.

SWC FFF: The Southwest Council Federation of Fly Fishers is composed of 23 individual

clubs in Southern California and Southern Nevada. Funds from the dinner will be used to fund Trout in the Classroom, casting and fly tying programs and ongoing

support for local clubs.

FLY OF THE MONTH

Shoup's Crazy Crayfish

his streamer generally resembles a crayfish pattern, with some added flash and mallard flank for extra movement. This is a great fly for bright days, as the materials will reflect the light and provide an additional attractant to the fish. This fly is best drifted close to the bottom, simulating a crayfish swimming along with the current.

Hook: #6 - #8 2XL Heavy Nymph Hook, Mustad

9672, Orvis J1526, or equivalent

Conehead: Medium Gold Conehead
Thread: Brown or Rust, size 6/0

Tail: Mixture of 2 colors of DNA fibers or Krystal

Flash (Root beer, Pearl, Red, Olive)

Body: Root beer or Olive Micro Chenille

Legs: Tan Caterpillar Legs
Wing: Olive or Brown Marabou

Collar: Mallard Duck Flank (Yellow, Gold, or Natural)




- 1. Slide the conehead onto the hook so the cone faces back toward the hook bend.
- Wrap the hook with thread down to parallel with hook point. Cut the DNA or Krystal fibers into sections to form a short, thick tail. Secure the tail so it sticks straight out parallel to hook shank.
- 3. Tie in the chenille at the tail. Do not wrap the chenille yet.
- 4. Cut 4 leg sections about 2" long. Make them all the same length. Secure 2 pairs of legs along the hook shank, leaving room between the front legs and the conehead for the wing and collar.
- 5. Wrap the chenille carefully. As you wrap, put one wrap over the point where the legs are secured. Continue wrapping until you have covered the front legs.

- 6. Tie in a wing make of the tip of a marabou feather. The wing should not be any longer than the chenille body section.
- 7. Strip the barbs from one side of the mallard flank feather. Tie in the mallard flank feather by pushing the tip of the quill up into the conehead and wrapping with thread. Wrap the collar around the hook shank, secure with thread, and trim off the tip of the feather.
- 8. Brush back all the barbs of the mallard flank.

 Secure with a few thread wraps. This will sweep the mallard flank rearward.
- 9. Wrap the thread several times behind the conehead to build up a thread dam. This will press the conehead toward the hook eye. Conclude with a whip finish. It is highly suggested to use head cement on this fly to keep the thread from unraveling.

Southwest Council FFF, California Trout Establish 'Trout in the Classroom' Fund

A joint fund with \$1,000 in "seed money" has been established collaboratively by California Trout and the Southwest Council Federation of Fly Fishers to bring Trout in the Classroom to local area elementary schools.

Trout in the Classroom (TIC) is a hands-on environmental education program in which students in grades K through 12 raise trout from eggs to fry, learn to monitor tank water quality, engage in stream habitat study, learn to appreciate water resources, begin to foster a conservation ethic and grow to understand ecosystems.

"While TIC is designed for grades K through 12, it seems best suited for the 5th grade. Activities include: science and art projects, journaling, measuring, math skills, and visual and language arts. TIC crosses all scholastic disciplines and results in stronger understanding of math, science and social studies," according to Rich Bollinger, Southwest Council FFF volunteer coordinator.

"The enthusiasm of students and teachers involved in TIC is manifest in the amazing variety and number of activities and projects. Not only are teachers using TIC in the classroom, sometimes whole schools and even communities turn out for the release. Some have made release day a 'mini-Earth Day,' with educational booths, field projects, river clean-up and more," said Nica Knite, CalTrout Regional Coordinator.

Trout in the Classroom projects will be funded one-third by the combined Southwest Council FFF and California Trout fund, one-third by the class participating in the program and one-third by a local fly-fishing club.


