

Lucky Ketcham says....

I fished the Green River on a camping trip last year and fell in love with the place. It is really not that far away and the scenery running the river is worth the trip. The fishing is the bonus. Bob Pharoah is coordinating a camp out and pontoon boat trip later in May/June.

This trip is not to be confused with Dave's Annual SDFF trip. It is more designed for the frugal fly fisher, like me. We are opening up the trip to anyone that wants to meet us on the river. People will be coming and going at different times to suit their schedules. See Bob for details.

Annual Spring Trip to the Flaming Gorge of the Green River! May 5-9, 2008

Toin us this year as we again travel to the Flaming Gorge of the Green River in northern Utah.

This has been the club's premiere trip for over 15 years. The 12 people who went last year had a great time. I pre-reserve the cars, rooms and guides ... you book your own air travel. The cost of the trip including airfare, car transportation, lodging, fishing license and floating guide (for 3 days) is estimated to be \$1,400. Guides (tax and tip included) are about \$240 per day per fisher this year (same as last year), so if you decide to wade without a guide one or more days, you can save on trip costs.

Plan to float at least one day though ... especially if you have never gone before ... it's a great way to see 7 miles of one of the most beautiful rivers you'll ever fish.

As it was last year, some of the guides charge a little less (though they still get raves from people who fished with them last year) ...I try to schedule it so everyone fishes with the less pricey guides, but if that's not possible, preference will be given according to who signs up first.

You have until April 7th to sign up, but the sooner you decide to sign up, the more likely you'll be able to book the "desired" Delta flight to Salt Lake City (It's the least expensive and it's non-stop).

Please sign up soon! If we get more than 12 fishers wanting to go, early signup will allow us time to book more cars, rooms and guides as needed.

think 2008 is going to be a great year for SDFF conservation efforts. We will continue to donate the proceeds from the Annual Raffle to conservation and education projects. This annually amounts to more than \$5,000 for ongoing efforts such as the Chollas Lake youth fishing program and the T.U. / Cal Trout Golden Trout and other Eastern Sierra conservation projects. We will continue with the efforts begun last year to make sure as much of our money as possible goes directly to local projects, and as little as possible to the national administrative costs.

FLY OF THE MONTH

Parachute Hopper

Hook - TMC 5212, Mustad 94831, 2X Long, 2X Fine

Size - #8 or #6

Thread - Tan or grey 6/0

Body - tan or yellow dubbing or chenille (fine) or sparkle yarn

Wing - Natural turkey tail
Legs - Pheasant tail knotted
Hackle - Grizzly for parachute

Post - deer hair, calf tail or poly yarn

Head - brown or grey dubbing





tart the thread at the 7/8 hook shank to mark the wing post position and wrap a thread base to the bend and back. I like to tie in the hair wing post first to allow you to blend in the butt ends with the abdomen. Remember wings are at the $\frac{3}{4}$ -shank mark for standard dry flies, and 7/8 for Parachutes and Comparaduns.

Calf tail post. Calf tail or white deer hair is more difficult to use than poly yarn but it looks good. Select a good clump of white calf tail, two match sticks in diameter. Clean out the short hairs and even up the tips by pulling out the long fibers and putting them back into the stack. It is difficult to stack crinkled calf tail. The thread is now at the 7/8 position in preparation for the wing. Size the bundle of hair to have two hook gaps sticking out in front of the thread mark. Hold the bundle on top of the hook and make two soft pinch wraps of thread. Pull down straight and make several tight wraps on top of each other. Wrap thread to the back a few turns and then pull up on the

front of the bundle. Make a thread dam in front of the post to lock it up at 90 degrees. Compact the post by wrapping 5 or 6 wraps up the post and then 5 or 6 down. Wrap around the hook shank in front and behind the post to secure. Trim the butt ends of the calf tail at an angle or trim by picking up the butts in three small bundles and trimming. Wrap thread over the cut butts and end at the bend of the hook. Do not use too many thread wraps or compress all the air out of the hair bundle. The hair will help the fly float.

(There is no tail on this recipe, but a little orange or red yarn loop or hackle fibers would never hurt.) Select a fairly large noodle of dry fly dubbing, yellow or tan. Attach at the bend, twist a loose rope around the thread and form a tapered abdomen. The abdomen is pointed at the end and fatter toward the mid-shank. Leave a small section of bare thread on the wing base for a better connection for the wing and legs. (They might pull out if tied on top of softer dubbing.)



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Fly of the Month

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
Treat a mottled turkey wing with Dave's Flexament, PVC Glue or just head cement to make it durable. Cut a slip of the wing 1 1/4 hook gap wide. Fold the wing, bi-laterally and trim the wing to make rounded tips. Size the wing to extend past the abdomen about $\frac{1}{2}$ hook gap. Attach the wing just in front of the abdomen, keeping it flat on top of the body. Make rear legs by knotting 5 to 7 pheasant tail fibers $\frac{1}{2}$ inch from the end. Use a crochet needle or Knit Picker tool to make the knot easier. Attach at each side of the wing tie down point. The elbow or joint of the rear legs should be at the hook bend. (Knotted rubber legs can be used as a substitute.). Add a small drop of head cement on the thread connection of legs and the base of the wing post for durability.

Select a grizzly rooster or saddle hackle sized at two hook gaps. Prepare the hackle, cleaning the barbs from $\frac{1}{4}$ inch of the quill. Attach the quill at the front of the post and wrap the thread around the quill and the post 5 or 6 times and end at the

rear of the post. Select some tan or grey dry fly dubbing for the thorax. If you used tan for the abdomen, use just a little darker shade for the thorax. Attach the dubbing noodle to the thread and wrap a thorax 30% larger than the abdomen. Figure 8 wrap in front and under the wing post. making an even platform for the parachute wing. Wrap up to the hook eye and back to the post. End the dubbing just behind the post. Wrap the grizzly hackle 5 or 6 times counter-clockwise down the pos, each wrap under the next. End close to the body. Pull tight on the hackle while wrapping the thread three times around the post close to the body. Pull the thread to the hook eye and whip finish. Trim the excess hackle with your scissor tips at the base of the wing. Trim thread and add a small drop of head cement.

The small hopper patterns were good on the Green River in the hotter part of the day. They were especially good when the wind picked up along sections that had grass or short bushes lining the banks.

on the enigmatic, pioneer builder Vince Marinaro, a mentor to Bill and whose cane collection is reputedly the most famous and valuable in the country; even though fewer than 20 of his rods are known to exist.

The show was held Fri.- Sun., 1/25-1/27 and there were at least 80 different lectures each on Fri. and Sat and 40 on Sun. Subjects varied from "The Heritage of Fly Fishing", "The Digital Road to Better Fly Fishing & Outdoor Photography" (Barry and Cathy Beck, of-course!) to exotic destination fishing spots all over the globe, including Kamchatka, Labrador and Ireland. Any place I would want to visit was represented.

I particularly enjoyed the differing 'takes' on how to fly cast by such people as Tim Rajeff, Allan Johnson (former national casting champion) and Ed Jaworwski vs. Lefty Kreh's well known methods. All the booths were close together....a little too close on Sat. with the number of attendees present and most clubs and organizations had raffles for some really plentiful and neat flies or hand-made cane rods. As I was there to pick up a

custom-ordered rod, I could hardly justify participating in all the raffles...but I was sorely tempted.

The Doubletree was a convenient location as the walk to the Exhibit center was close (and covered) and they had economical buffet breakfasts, lunches and dinners as well as the normal (= overpriced) on-site deli and bar areas. Getting to Somerset NJ was as simple as flying into Newark and hopping the N.E. corridor train to New Brunswick and having the hotel shuttle pick me up.....an automated train connects the airport to the rail lines.

I saw more cane-related booths than I ever have here in Ca. and all the exhibitors were keen to allow you to cast their offerings. A few insisted they follow you outside for lawn casting (most of the indoor casing areas were jammed full)....probably to ensure their efforts were not abused or removed! Per Brandin, probably the most famous and skilled commercial rod builder today did not have a booth but was there to have some of his peers test-cast some new prototypes. He spent a lot of time talking to many of the more well-known contemporary builders there and I believe a bunch of

them fish the Delaware together each year, courtesy of rod broker, Robert Selb. Another notable thing is that Jeff Wagner has his female partner do the splitting, straightening and tempering of his rods. He mainly does the finer, finishing work.....and very nice work they both do too!

The fly tying area was full of wellknown tyers like Gary Borger, the Becks, Al Caucci, Ed Engle, Dick Talleur, Bob Popovics et al. I particularly enjoyed talking to guide, author and tyer, Capt. John Kumiski. For some reason, I seem to think famous people are unapproachable but this proved to be untrue. I found out for example that guides for the San Francisco-based Leyland Brothers Outfitters know little about surf fishing.... especially here in San Diego. None knew there was a viable bonefish fishery and one guide used to live here. So, we can all bring something to the table....well, I now think so.

So, that's it in brief. I highly recommend this show if you have an interest (or addiction) in cane. If not, you will even see graphite rods from all the major makers.

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
