






The Park is next to the Coronado Bay Bridge

Golden Trout 2015

Once again a stalwart group of San Diego Fly Fishers with some family and friends drove through desert heat and up windy mountain roads to the Sequoia National Forest, and then hiked along a beautiful trail into the Golden Trout Wilderness to rebuild a cattle exclusion fence in our adopted meadow. This year's trip was early because we didn't have to wait for the snow to melt. Signs of the prolonged drought were everywhere: dead and dying trees, brown grass and drying streams. But our little meadow, particularly the areas protected by the fence, were doing relatively well. The rivulets that feed this golden trout spawning ground are being partially sustained by some early thunderstorms, one of which we witnessed first-hand on Saturday. As soon as we finished repairing the fence and were preparing to fish, BOOM: almost an inch of rain mixed with hail drenched us for several hours. Next time we won't believe the weather re-



ports, and we will take our rain gear with

us to the meadow. It wasn't much help stored back at camp. Larry Sorensen and Bill Bacon prepared an amazing dinner while a roaring fire helped dry us out. Then our newest member Bob Payne, after catching beautiful golden for his first fish on a fly rod, warmed our hearts with some excellent cigars.

Sunday, dawned bright sunny and warm. Since the work was mostly done we headed to the meadow early to fish before the wind picked up. The results can be seen in this picture of Lars' 13 inch golden. That may

bioassessments next summer. SDFP volunteers performed a bioassessment in the meadow four years ago. USFS biologists want us to do it again after five years. We will see if keeping grazing cattle out of this little stream has helped it survive the drought.

Special thanks go to Bruce Michaels who went up a day early to get a head start on putting the fence up and make sure we weren't the first humans the fish saw this Spring. He and his crew from SIO did the heavy work of carrying most of the new posts down to the meadow; a job normally reserved for USFS mules. I particularly

not seem like a big fish, but in this creek which sits at nearly 9,000 ft and is less than two feet wide in places, we have not seen anything over 10 inches in the nine years we have been taking care of the meadow. I'd like to believe that has something to do with the hard work we have done. Certainly, the goldens are surviving the drought better in this meadow than in many other places. We should know more about the benefits of our efforts after we perform

Fly of the Month

Federation of Fly Fishers Fly of the Month February 2010
MARCH BROWN

Anglers who live in an area that has streams with March Brown hatches are truly fortunate. The March Brown (Genus *Rithrogena*) is a clinger mayfly that inhabits fast flowing streams. Where populations exist it is one of the earliest hatching mayflies, and it comes in fairly large sizes (#12-14) which might be why it is so popular. People in Oregon are among the fortunate ones; their March Browns hatch in late February to March. In the higher altitude streams of the Rocky Mountains or Canada the hatch might be as late as mid-May. March Browns attract the trout, and the trout attract anglers.

All of the March Brown patterns that I have photographed for the FFF Fly of the Month (FOM) have been at the NW Fly Tying & Fly Fishing Expo in Albany, Oregon. To see the other March Brown Patterns, see FOM October 2008, March Brown Soft Hackle and February 2009, March Brown Emerger. This adult March Brown (February 2010) was tied by Monica Mullen at the 2009 N.W. Fly Tying & Fly Fishing Expo in Albany, Oregon.

Fish it with a floating line and a drag

free float. Depending on conditions there are several ways to achieve a drag free float. You can cast a little upstream and let the fly float back to you. You can wiggle the rod before the line hits the water so it will land with a bunch of “S” curves. You can lean your body and rod upstream as far as possible before the line hits the water to throw an upstream bend in the line. Often fly casters in your local fly club will help, or you can talk to a FFF Certified Fly Casting Instructor. Certified instructors are listed on the FFF website: www.fedflyfishers.org.

Materials list:

Hook: Dry Fly: Size 10
Thread: Gudebrod brown, 6/0
Tails: Microfibbets, dark
Post: Antron yarn, brown
Body: Hackle quill, brown, tan, etc.
Hackle: Brown
Thorax: Dubbing, brown

Tying steps:

1. Line hook with thread. Start at front of

hook and wind back to bend.

2, Tie on four Microfibbets to make a shank length Tail. Take a piece of thread and place it around the back of the hook. Slide thread along the hook up to the bend, and between the Microfibbets to spread them with two fibers on each side. Then tie the thread down.

3. Fold Antron yarn in half, and tie both pieces on at a point one third shank length back from the eye.

4. Pull up Antron and wrap thread in front of Antron to hold it up. Then wrap thread around the base of the Antron to hold the four strands together. This is posting, and it gives a base for winding on the hackle. Build up a base of thread on the body for the quill. Leave the thread at the back of the hook.

5. Tie on a feather quill by the tip just in front of the tail, and wind the thread forward to behind the post. Monica keeps the quills in a crock pot with warm water and a few drops of hair conditioner. This keeps them pliable and easier to wrap.



We stayed in Mammoth Lakes, but found the 8000 foot altitude a little tough on us. Next time we will stay in Bishop, which is at 4000 feet.

Tom is an excellent guide and a pleasure to fish with. His boat is equipped with latest equipment and very comfortable. The ease of changing depths with Tom's indicators was a breeze. Tom would find the proper depth by attaching his forceps to the lower fly and lowered it till it hit the bottom. He would than adjust the depth of the leader.



LAHONTAN CUTTHROAT TROUT RECOVERY – SUMMER 2015

Dates: June – September 2015

Places: Silver and Slinkard Creeks, CA

Volunteers are needed this coming summer for a landmark conservation project in the Eastern Sierras. Take part in the restoration of Silver and Slinkard Creeks as habitat is returned to the region's majestic native fish, the Lahontan cutthroat trout. This project will occur from late June through September.

July Speaker: Guy Jeans

Fly fishing guide and Kern River Fly Shop Owner, Guy Jeans, has been fly fishing the Southern Sierra area for over 30 years. For the year of 2014, he has instructed and taught over 650 people and currently spends over 200 days a year guiding on the waters that cover a major portion of the Southern Sierra Region, which includes the Sequoia National Forest and the Golden Trout Wilderness. The majority of Guy's time is spent on the Kern River and its Tributaries. Anglers come from all over the world to catch three of California's Native Trout which are found only in their native habitat throughout the Southern Sierra streams. These trout are California Golden Trout, the Kern River Rainbow, and the Little Kern Golden.

In addition to guiding along the Kern River, Guy's expert guiding and superb teaching led him to being asked to be a host for fly fishing trips and to be a guide in Northwestern Montana. He also provides casting clinics and lectures at numerous sportsmen shows and events, and teaches fly fishing in the California surf.

In 2004, Guy created and was a charter member of the Southern Sierra Fly Fishers Club located in Kernville, California. In 2014, the Southern Sierra Fly Fishers received the McKenzie Cup from the International Federation of Fly Fishers (IFFF) for their conservation work on the Kern River Rainbow as well as their very popular "Kids Fly Fishing Academy" held every spring.

Guy is recognized as a IFFF Certified Casting Instructor and in 2012, received the "Lee Wulff Award" from the IFFF. He is the host of the critically acclaimed DVDs, *Volume I "Sierra Fly Fishing - The Lower Kern River"* and *Volume II, "The Kern River in the Golden Trout Wilderness"*. Guy occasionally writes fly fishing articles for magazines and newspapers such as Southwest Fly Fishing Magazine. Through-

out the year, Guy lectures and teaches at various clubs and events on the fly fishing opportunities of the Southern Sierra. He is a contractual fly designer for Solitude Fly Company. Guy's most popular design, the "Kern Emerger" series, is sold and fished internationally.

Guy was born and raised in the beautiful coastal town of Ventura, California, where he enjoyed surfing and fishing. In addition to these activities, Guy made a living composing, writing and performing music for various bands as a pianist/singer. As a musician traveling to different areas of the west to perform, he discovered the Kern River and many other waters of the Southern Sierra. The love Guy developed for the waters he encountered over 30 years ago eventually led to pioneering a fly-fishing guide service, a fly-fishing school and opening, "Kern River Fly Shop". In Guy's spare time, he still performs today with his newly-created band, "Stoneflies". While promoting their CD, "Emergence" they perform at music festivals and various benefit concerts to raise money for breast cancer research and educational foundations.

Guy is recognized as a Pro Staff member for Redington Fly Rods and Hatch Reels. In addition, he is a Simms Guide Ambassador for Simms fishing products. You can learn more about Guy, the Kern River Fly Shop and the Kern River Fly Fishing Guide

easier and safer to buy them from Cabela's, Orvis, a local fly shop or some other supplier. This pattern floats well in the faster water where the *Rithrogena* lives. If you are new to fly fishing, talk to people at your local fly shop to see if the March Brown is in your area and when it hatches.

The flyer below is for informational purpose as some members of our club are also members of the **International Federation of Fly Fishers**.

This Fly Fishing Fair is **not** the same as the **Southwest Council of IFFF Fly Fishing Faire**.

6. Wind quill forward carefully and secure in front of post. Put a little head cement or Sally Hansen's Hard as Nails on the quill.

7. Select a hackle, and trim the barbs so there is a little stubble to help secure the hackle. Tie it on in front of post. Put a little brown dubbing on the thread, and wrap a thorax in front of and behind the post. Finish with thread behind the eye.


8. Start wrapping hackle by putting the first wrap up the post, and putting each succeeding wrap under the preceding one. Tie off the hackle behind the eye, and trim excess. When asked how many wraps Monica said: "Use all of the feather." Trim the thread, and trim the post about a shank length high. Put a drop of head cement on top of the hackle, and hold the fly so it runs down the barbs into the post

Closing comments: You can make your own quills by burning off the barbs and dyeing them. However, it is




