We just returned from our week-long vacation, including a few days of attempts to attract steelhead on the Feather River. Our day trip with a local guide yielded a few fish (hubby and I would both have preferred several more!), a few of which escaped without setting the hook (can I blame the barbless hook?); that only served to remind me that I definitely need more casting practice!

On that note, one of our resident Certified Casting Instructors and Board of Directors member, John Wylie, will be revamping our club's Casting Program for next year, with some great ideas to improve the program and benefit you as students of the program. He will present more details at a coming club meeting.

And, since I mentioned it last month - the Southwest Council's Women's Fly Fishing Workshop gave me some good ideas for our own Women's Program, in concert with some of the ideas we will be using to revamp our local club casting program. We have confirmed the date for our first half-day introductory workshop on Saturday, November 16th, so ladies, please RSVP to women-sprogram@sandiegoflyfishers.com to reserve your space. The nominal \$20 fee can be paid in person at the workshop. It's an awesome deal, at that price!

Our trip north also served to remind me of the importance of two other things.

Number One - Our emphasis on conservation is necessary. We learned about the salmon and steelhead life cycles, and saw salmon egg processing at the Feather River Fish Hatchery, while touring the facility. Our trip guide also provided more education on the local issues with those two species. While the hatchery and egg processing is clearly human intervention, this provides a significant improvement in the success rate for the annual spawning of both species.

Number Two - We also need to continue two other tasks, as a club, and as individuals. As a club, the first is education of future generations on the importance of conservation and the science behind it. Our participation in Trout In the Classroom is one example of ways we can accomplish this goal. There is still much to learn but we have made significant progress, compared to days gone by. As individuals, the second is for each of us to stay up to date on current legal issues affecting our sport and the target species we seek. Since we are all citizens in a democracy, we have both the freedom and the responsibility to contact our elected officials and express our concerns and opinions on these issues. They need to hear from us.

The lowly Soft Hackle

The soft hackle fly has stood the test of time.

It's simplicity in no way effects the versatility of this fly. In it's simplest for it is nothing more than thread or floss wrapped around a hook with a sparsely palmered hackle at the front. More elaborate patterns extend this basic design concept but may not necessarily improve it's effectiveness. Take the Japanese Tenkara fly or Kebari for instance, thread or herl wrapped around the hook with a very soft hackle at the front. Simplicity at it's best. The soft hackle can be dead drifted, where it can imitate an emerging insect. Fished down stream and across on the swing is most likely the deadliest method of fishing this pattern. There is no incorrect way to fish this fly.

The Basic Pattern

Hook: Standard Dry or wet fly hook, size 12 to 16.

Body: Thread or Floss. Color of your choice.

Thorax: Peacock herl. (optional)

Hackle: Partridge or Hen from the neck of the bird.

Crimp the barb if you are not using barbless hooks.

Begin by attaching your thread or floss one eye gap behind the eye of the hook.

Wrap the thread or floss to the bend of the hook and return to about 2/3 point of the hook.

Continue to wrap down and back until you have created a slightly tapered body.

Select a hackle feather of the appropriate size and tie it in by the tip in front of the body with the shinny side up.

Wrap the hackle twice around the hook and tie off.

Create a small head in front of the hackle and whip finish.

NOTE: To create a Kebari pattern tie in the hackle by the tip shinny side up with the stem forward before creating the body.

San Diego Fly Fishers is happy to offer two free clinics each month to help you learn to fly cast or improve your skills. Several of our instructors are certified by the FFI and can help anyone develop the skills that will help you get the most out of your casts.

• Basic fly Casting Lessons

This Clinic is best suited for beginners and novice fly casters. The clinic will help you develop the basic techniques necessary for successful casts with a fly rod. No experience is required to participate.

Where: Lake Murray (Kiowa Drive entrance) When: Each Sunday (weather permitting) at 9 AM What to Bring: You may bring your own equipment or use rods provided by the Club. No fishing license is required.

Intermediate Fly Casting Instruction (This clinic is run by FFI Certified Casting Instructors Dennis Panish and John Wylie and is intended to aid fly casters in enhancing their skills and learn to cast efficiently in different conditions. One goal of the clinic is to help fly casters solve problems with there casting strokes. If you suffer from "wind knots", learning how to "double haul" or increasing your distance this class is for you. Tell our instructors what you want to work on and they will help.

We provide single hand casting as well as basic double hand spey cast instruction.

Tip of The Month: Practice Makes Perfect-almost

As I write this I am up n Glendale at the SWC FFI Faire. I am helping out teaching some of the casting classes.

It's really a great event and it's fun to be at the Pasadena Casting Club's casting pool seeing so many people with a fly rod in their hand working on casting! Talking to participants a common refrain is "I wish I had more time to practice".

- Practice is critical to improving our casting, here are some thoughts on making practice more useful and practical.
- Practice more often but for a shorter period of time. Keep a rod to practice with in your car and try to practice in 15 to 30 minute chunks of time. During your lunch break, on the way home, while the kids are at soccer practice...any time you have a few extra minutesstring a rod and get a few minutes of practice in.
- Practice with a focused objective. Pick a skill and just work on that one skill until you are happy with the results. Loop control, slipping line, reach casts, roll casts....the list can go on. When you check one off...move to the next.
- Practice at your desk, or in a chair! Any time you find yourself sitting, grab a pencil or other imaginary rod, and practice your casting stroke. I have been known to work on my casting stroke while listening to a conference call! Anytime you can build that muscle memory counts as practice time!

Don't wait till your next fishing trip to work on your casting! Grab a rod, or a pencil, and get that practice time in!

The Total Package By Joel Stewart

I was very fortunate to have ended up in an assignment that had a trout stream right outside of my quarters. My back porch over looked Letort Spring Run as it cuts through Carlisle Barracks. It is not the marshy spring creek that flows on either side of the base. Here, it is a disciplined and regimented waterway, hemmed into a man-made channel of stone and mortar. No undercut banks, no tree roots, nor any other structure to provide fish with security. It runs for about a half mile further beyond my quarters before it exits the base and joins the other branch after flowing under Post Road. In the stretch below my home there was a bit of cover, in the form of some deeper pools formed at bends in the flume. These were the places I have seen a few small trout, though one source assures me that in the fall there are bigger fish in there. Personally, I'd not seen a fish over six inches long in this stretch. I'd seen big fish above and below the base but not here. Still it is lovely water and nice to know that I could look out my window at a famous trout stream.

I attempted to fish it several times, to no avail. I stalked its banks looking for fish but only saw a few small fish. I fished nymphs, streamers, and terrestrials only to be rewarded with one strike. That strike came from swinging a streamer on a moonlit night. With so many other options within 30 minutes, I gave up on the Letort. Until a cool winter day.

I was returning from research at the library and walked along the creek to go home. I didn't normally take this route, but just felt like doing it on this chilly February afternoon. It was a bit above freezing but the wind was not blowing so despite the overcast being outside was not miserable. It was nice to feel the sun and listening to the babbling of the crick. I wasn't really looking but I heard a splash and saw a ring. Trout, I wondered? In reply another rose further down the same run. I then knelt and looked closely at the water. There was a mayfly dun, about size 18. A blue winged olive to be more specific. As I looked, two more trout rose. I knew I did not have any BWOs in my fly box. I hadn't really been tying anything but nymphs on an as needed basis. Now I needed dry flies, and fast. I had a research paper that was due the next day, but it was practically done. I just had to insert some foot notes and proof read it. I could certainly tie a couple flies and see if I could fool a fish...yeah, that sounds like a good plan.

I went home and into my basement lair. My bench was neither organized nor prepared for tying, but I found some hair, dubbing, yarn, and hackle. I have been using Firehole Stiks for my trout flies and I really like them. I also like that they are from a Montana company that is family owned. I used a Firehole 413 competition hook in size 18 to tie on a tail of 4 white moose hairs, a body of fine synthetic olive dubbing, counter wrapped with a loop of thread, a wing of grey poly yarn, and a Whiting dun neck hackle. I prefer a parachute style fly most of the time and that is what I turned out. I also tied a soft-hackle, spinner, and cripple with that same materials while I had them out. Six flies in 30 minutes, I could still fish a bit before I wrapped up my paper. I can type when its dark out and these fish would not be rising all day.

I really only fish about five dry flies: a dubbed body mayfly, Adams style, in grey, olive, tan, brown, purple, and rainbow; an elk hair caddis in tan, brown, rust, white, and black (sometimes with rubber legs like a Madam X); a foam Krazy Jimmy Hopper; a Humpy in red, yellow, and green; and a black ant with a white wing. Sure there are times I fish other flies, but 90% of the trout I catch are on one of these five flies. Now add in the colors and sizes and I still carry a lot of flies, but I believe presentation is more important than a perfect match. Flies are impressionistic. If fish were that picky, why do they ignore the hook that bends out of the fly's body? I think color and basic shape are all you need, just present it well.

I put my freshly tied flies in a box, collected my lanyard and TFO Finesse 7'9" 3wt with a BVK I reel, and headed out the door. It was not even a five minute walk from my quarters to the stretch where the trout were rising. Luck was with me; they were still feeding! Some of the takes were subtle but most were sloppy and loud, indicating the fish were taking duns or emergers. I put on a new leader, tied up by my buddy Chris Fave. Chris makes the best hand-tied leaders you can buy and he'd made me some spring creek specials that I was excited to use. My hands were shaking a bit as I tied on the fly. I picked the BWO parachute based on the aggressive feeding.

I decided to make a downstream drift, as the narrow channel would force me to keep part of my leader on the bank and reduce the distance I could drift a fly drag free. The water was crystal clear and I knew the fish were spooky, so I stayed well up stream and limbered up a cast. I laid it out, pulling up short to cause the line to puddle and give me the drift I wanted. It worked, but the fish missed the fly. I presented the same cast and this time the hook found purchase. It was a wild brown trout of maybe 5 inches. Not a trophy in size for some, but certainly in all respects a prize for me. I'd been looking at this creek for months and fished it without success a dozen times. Now, on a dreary winter afternoon, I held my quarry. The barbless hook slipped out with ease and the fish darted off for cover. I no longer felt the chill in the air; that first little fish warmed me right up.

I continued to work my way down stream, casting and letting my fly drift over likely spots. Another small trout smashed my fly just as it started to drag at the end of a drift. He made a couple of jumps and spit the hook. Soon after that another sipped my offering and darted into the watercress. I worked him out and brought him to hand before giving him back to the water. One more small fish grabbed my fly and made two leaps before tossing the hook. Man this is fun, I thought!

I spotted a sloppy take in the corner of a deep hole. It required a long cast that would have to quarter across the current. The current had a number of seems so I used an "S" cast to place multiple mends in hopes of a good drift. The fly settled into the surface and swirled around in a small eddy. Just as it exited the swirl it disappeared with a splash. I set the hook and felt a fish a bit heavier than the other fish I'd hooked. It surged up against the pressure of my line and gave me a great acrobatic display in a shower of spray. Another leap showcased golden hues with black spots. Soon the gorgeous wild brown was in my hand. Not a huge fish but 11 inches is twice the size of the others I caught. Moreover it was the culmination of all that is fly fishing.

I'd seen activity, identified a food source, tied a representative imitation, presented it, and landed a fish. It was a singularly satisfying moment. All my skills developed over more than four decades allowed me to fool a creature with a brain the size of a pea. Still, I felt accomplished.

Fall Montana Fly-fishing "Bonanza" on the Madison and Big Hole Rivers By Sam & Mona Morebello

Late summer fishing on these two popular rivers was very productive. We spent two days on the Madison and several days on the Upper Big Hole out of Twin Bridges and on the Lower Big Hole they call "The Cottonwoods". Due to the thin, warm waters, the guides must respect the "Hot Owl" curfew time restrictions that say you must be off the river by 2:00 PM or pay a fine. The fish were taking Hoppers despite the unseasonably warm temperatures. Our catches included countless Rainbows, Browns and White fish ranging in size from 10-18 +inches. In addition to the great fishing, the wildlife was amazing...we even had 2 days with not a single other boat on the river...can't beat private waters for catching!

Drift boat rigs were mostly Hoppers with Nymph droppers or indicator with Girdle Bug and Prince Nymph dropper...easy to see with our old eyes! The guides were very knowledgeable and sensitive to our limitations. Below you will find the contact information for some great places to stay and Fly Shops that are reliable. NOMINEES: The Stroud Award was designed in 2004 to recognize individuals or organizations from outside the Club that meet the Club's criteria. Club members may also be nominees, and several members have won the Stroud Award. All nominees must be endorsed by two members of the Club.

DUE DATE DEADLINE: All nominee forms must be completed, signed and submitted to any Past President by December 15.

SELECTION PROCEDURE: The selection committee made up of the Club's current president and the two most recent presidents, or their appointed past president chairman, will screen all nominees for eligibility and select the top five candidates. The winner will be selected by cumulative vote of all Past Presidents.
