Recent surveys have shown some positive developments while drought and wildfires have proven detrimental. Highlights will include recent translocations, drought monitoring, fire impacts, angler survey box data summaries, and invasive species removal.

This presentation will be broad and will cover non-game species as well as rainbow trout work.

Feature Article

Parts Unknown

Seven degrees south of the equator lies a rocky atoll in the Indian Ocean called *Diego Garcia*. This article is a "Fly Fishing Primer" for those anglers lucky enough to find a way there. Most of the credit goes to Ben (you know who you are) for allowing me to incorporate his work into this article.

Editor's note: Not likely that we will get a chance to fish this spot, but the story is awesome, and the skills suggested are surely transferable. Joel is a member of SDFF and has spoken to the club in the past.



The Indian Ocean is a vast stretch of open water. Right in the middle of it is the Chagos Ridge and subsequent island chain. Part of the archipelago is Diego Garcia; perhaps the finest inaccessible tropical fly-fishing location anywhere in the world. The south atoll in the Chagos Ridge, Diego Garcia, supports a diverse environment that has abundant fish, beautiful natural scenery, and ample opportunity for anglers of all skill levels. Few people ever have the opportunity to experience it firsthand because access is controlled tightly. Diego Garcia is part of the British Indian Ocean Territory (BIOT) that exercises jurisdiction over the region. The island serves as a base for US ships and aircraft. It is not a vacation destination. The only way here is to have a job. The military controls all flights so you must have orders, country clearance, and travel approval to board any aircraft bound for the island. Sail here on a boat and you may find your yacht impounded along with a stiff fine.

Not all of the island is accessible for fishing. The north half of the lagoon and it's west flats are the only fishing areas inside the atoll. About 21 miles of surfside on the western coast are open to fishing but limited to wading no more than knee deep. This is not a managed fishery but a military base that allows recreational fishing. There is no flexibility in the rules.

During the fall/winter (March-September), prevailing winds blow from the southeast, making the western ocean side more favorable for fly fishing. During the spring/summer (October-February), the winds come from the north-west making the lagoon side slightly more favorable. The best tides for the flats occur during the first 1/3-1/2 of the flooding spring tides which range about 1.75m. Fishing the inside sand flats is best on a .5m or lower tide with little to no wind (the fine sand muddies up the water very quickly). Neap tides can allow for decent fishing as well but water levels are usually quite high limiting accessible areas. Different places along the outside support different tides. There is a spot for just about everything except the highest spring tides.

Recommended Equipment

This list of recommended equipment is pretty straight forward. The most versatile rod is a fast-action 8 weight that can handle almost all of the flats species, although rods as light as 6 and 7 weights or as heavy as 9 and 10 weights can be used successfully. An 8 or 9 will allow for opportunities at larger trigger fish, bluefin trevally, and the "baby" Giant Trevallies (GTs). Giant trevally, some exceeding 80 pounds, are an occasional target. An 11 or 12 weight rod is ideal for these bruisers. Floating lines handle the bulk of the work, although there are limited applications for sinking lines from boats and piers. I recommend "up-lining" a size as most shots are within 50 feet and the wind can be fierce at times (e.g. put an 8 wt line on a 7wt rod). A back-up line or two is recommended due to large amount of coral. Standard salt-water, disk drag reels holding 200+ yards of backing are appropriate. Medium-fast action rods are preferred due to frequent high winds. This is not a place for your trout rod here... leave it at home!

Fluorocarbon leaders between 9 and 12 feet will cover the vast majority of situations. (I like 15# as an all-round choice but 20# is better around coral heads). Bring spools of 12, 15, 20, 30, 40, and 60# mono or fluorocarbon tippet to cover the bases. A leader formula that works well is 30in 60#, 18in 40#, 18in 30# 18in 20# 24in 15#. A simpler leader is the 4-3-2 4ft 40#, 3ft 30#, 2ft 20#. Don't use loops, they hang in the guides. Blood knots are the way to go.

An assortment of medium-weighted bonefish and permit flies size 2-6 will handle most of the work. Pale (white, cream, and tan) work best inside the lagoon on the sand flats. Darker flies (orange, olive, and brown) and a chartreuse/white Clouser minnow are best for surfside flats. A few poppers and baitfish patterns in #1-4/0 will be handy for barracuda and trevally. Successful flies tend to be slightly heavier here than in the Caribbean. Specific gear, fly and leader information is provided in the species-specific recommendations below.

Dress for sun and heat. Long sleeve breathable shirts, gloves, and face protection. A wide brimmed hat and good quality polarized sunglasses (copper/green are beat on the flats) are a must. Your feet are vital and the reef is brutal. lats sneakers/wading boots, sun protective clothing, polarized sun-glasses, a wide brimmed hat, and a pack to carry water and gear is essential.

Specific Species, Bonefish



Ample opportunity exists for small to medium sized bonefish on both the inner and outer flats. It is not unusual to spot multiple 20+ fish schools during a tide. Normally, there is a realistic shot at 2-5 very large adults and often more. There are potential world record-sized fish occasionally on these flats! Bonefish are notoriously difficult to spot and it takes time to learn to "see" the fish. Most people find it easier to spot them on sand flats than the coral flats. Often, you can find them feeding along the edges of parrotfish and triggerfish schools which are easy to spot. They rarely tail in Diego, but when they do, it is a marvelous sight.

Rod: 6-8 weight Line: WF-Floating Leader: 9-10', 12-16# mono or fluorocarbon (less than 12# is unnecessary and will result in coral breakoffs) Flies: Larger and more heavily weighted bonefish flies (#2-4) are generally required due to the water depth on the outside flats (1-3 feet) and wave/swell action although a selection of lighter bead chain patterns is recommended in the shallow and protected inside sand flats. Oddly, chartreuse flies perform very well on the outer flat. Tan

and pink are top performers on the lagoon side.

General advice for bonefish flies

- The most important factors are color/flash, size, weight and style. Here are some general thoughts: Start with weight. The fly should sink at the rate you want. As a general rule, the deeper the water on a flat, the heavier the fly should be. However, there are exceptions such as trigger fish where you want the fly to immediately sink to the bottom (use a heavier fly). In surf conditions, it generally helps to have a heavier fly to reduce the amount of wave action. In skinny water, weightless or lightly weighted flies are appropriate. You want to give the fish a reasonable chance to see the fly before it hits the bottom but not an unnatural amount of time. Use very light flies (unweighted or bead chain) when fishing for tailing fish in very shallow water to avoid spooking them.
- Size is an important factor. Fish key in on certain prey. The size of the fly should mimic the bait. Most shrimp, worms and small fish should be in the #2 -6 range (#4 most common). Most crabs should be in the #2-#1 size. Consider decreasing a size if the fish turn away from a fly or increasing if you are looking for larger fish.
- Color is probably least important. The conventional wisdom is to use natural colored flies mimicking the general flat color (e.g. tans and pinks in sand and browns and greens in coral). Also, it is said that light colored flies with minimal flash work best on clear days and bright, flashy ones are the choice for cloudy days. However, there are many people who are successful with bright "attractor" patterns. If you ask 10 people, they will probably give you 10 opinions. Several anglers have found that gaudy chartreuse flies work very well on the ocean-side flats here.



- The style of fly should be chosen based on prey (shrimp, crab, fish, etc), conditions (castability, sink rate), movement (jigging, sliding, or crawling action), and weedlessness (hook up, weed guards, etc).
- Never, ever touch a fly with sunscreen on your hands. The smell will turn off most fish and you may never clean it off.

Fly of the Month

The Jalopy



(from Joel Steward)

Never know what is going to grab a **Jalopy**! This is my favorite flats fly. I can't keep track of the species I've caught on it: GTs, permit, bonefish, bluefin trevally, yellow spot trevally, golden Trevally, big eye trevally, snappers, groupers, darts, threadfin and so on.

Materials:

I am a big fan of 60° hooks and tie this exclusively on the Umpqua XS506 SH in size 4 & 6.

Hook:	Umpqua XS506 SH 2-8
Thread:	UTC 140 Burnt Orange (Shell pink for blonde version)
Eyes:	4mm brass dumbbell
Body:	Arizona Diamond Dub copper/olive (Gold olive for blonde version)
Underwing:	Calftail (gold or chartruse) (coyote for blonde version)
Legs:	Rootbeer/orange sparkle crazy legs (olive for blonde version)
Wing:	Fox squirrel tail (badger for blonde version)

Lay down a thread base starting at the eye to 1/2 way down the shank. Tie in the eyes after the front bend and wrap back to the aft bend. Dub on the body material and wrap forward to the eyes. Tie in the calftail in front of the eyes and secure it behind the eyes. Calftail should extend to the bend. Rotate the hook. Tie in the legs. Length should be 2x shank. Select wing, making sure to get a mix of top and bottom hair to give the fly a two-tone pattern. Squirrel hair does not compress, so tie it tightly. A drop of super glue will help hold it. Cover wing butt and whip finish. I glue all my saltwater flies with Solarez thin. Good luck!

Conservation & Education



Golden Trout Trip June 24-27, 2021



Once again this year we are planning our volunteer conservation and fishing trip into the Golden Trout Wilderness June 24-27. This is our biggest conservation effort each year. We take a dozen or two hardy volunteers on a 2 mile hike into Casa Vieja Meadow where we work as USFS volunteers erecting a barbed wire and electric fence designed to keep grazing cattle away from Nine Mile Creek that runs through the meadow. We always plan time for fishing and almost everyone catches fish. My 10-year-old grandson caught 15 golden trout on his first trip with a fly rod so this is a good place for beginners. Most of these beautiful trout are small but each trip we catch a few up to 14 inches.

We camp at the Blackrock Trailhead above Kennedy Meadows in Sequoia National Forest. It a narrow but paved road all the way and many of us sleep in our vehicles or small RVs, but there are prepared

tent sites. We set up a group kitchen and share meal preparation duties. The site is above 9,000 ft so it can be cold or rainy and some folks have trouble sleeping at that altitude if they have breathing issues. The trail into the meadow is well prepared but steep. We only carry small day packs so most folks find the daily hike up out of the meadow strenuous but doable. We allow plenty of time for hiking at your own pace. This is a family friendly event, but only recommended for children 10 or older with some hiking experience.
